Capital High School is committed to a caring, motivating environment in which our students develop the knowledge, skills, attitudes, and self-worth to succeed in this diverse, changing world.

About Our School:

Capital High School is a grade 9-12, "AAAA" National Blue Ribbon award winner. The school year is divided into three 12-week trimesters. Capital offers a comprehensive curriculum with advanced course work available in every curriculum area.

Additional academic programs include opportunities at New Market Vocational Skill Center, Running Start, School to Work, and the International Baccalaureate Program, which is a rigorous pre-university course of study. Three quarters of Capital's students participate in athletics and activities.

Parent and community involvement include the following organizations: Site Council, Foundation, Booster Club, and Parent Organization.

Additions to the 31-year-old building have increased student capacity from 1389 to 1680. The latest remodeling effort, completed in 2006, added 12 new classrooms, including new science and technology labs. The student commons section and kitchen space has been expanded to accommodate all students over two lunch periods. The renovation also included substantial upgrades to the drama, music, art and special education learning areas.

Based on the October 1, 2005 enrollment report, there are 1,514 students enrolled at Capital High School with an ethnic composition of:

There are 52.9% male students and 47.1% female students. The student attendance rate is 93.66%.

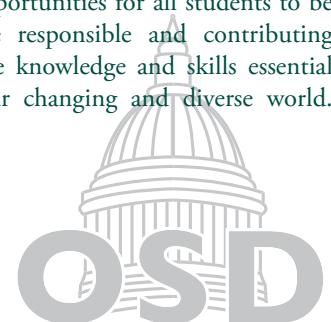

WRITING GOAL - Increase student achievement in writing so that 95% of CHS students meet standard on the 10th grade writing WASL in 2007 and 100% by graduation in 2008.

MATH GOAL - Increase student achievement in math so that 80% of students meet standard on the math WASL in the 10th grade in 2007 and 95% meet standard by the end of 12th grade in 2008.

SCIENCE GOAL - Increase student achievement in science so that 70% of students meet standard on the science WASL in the 10th grade in 2007.
