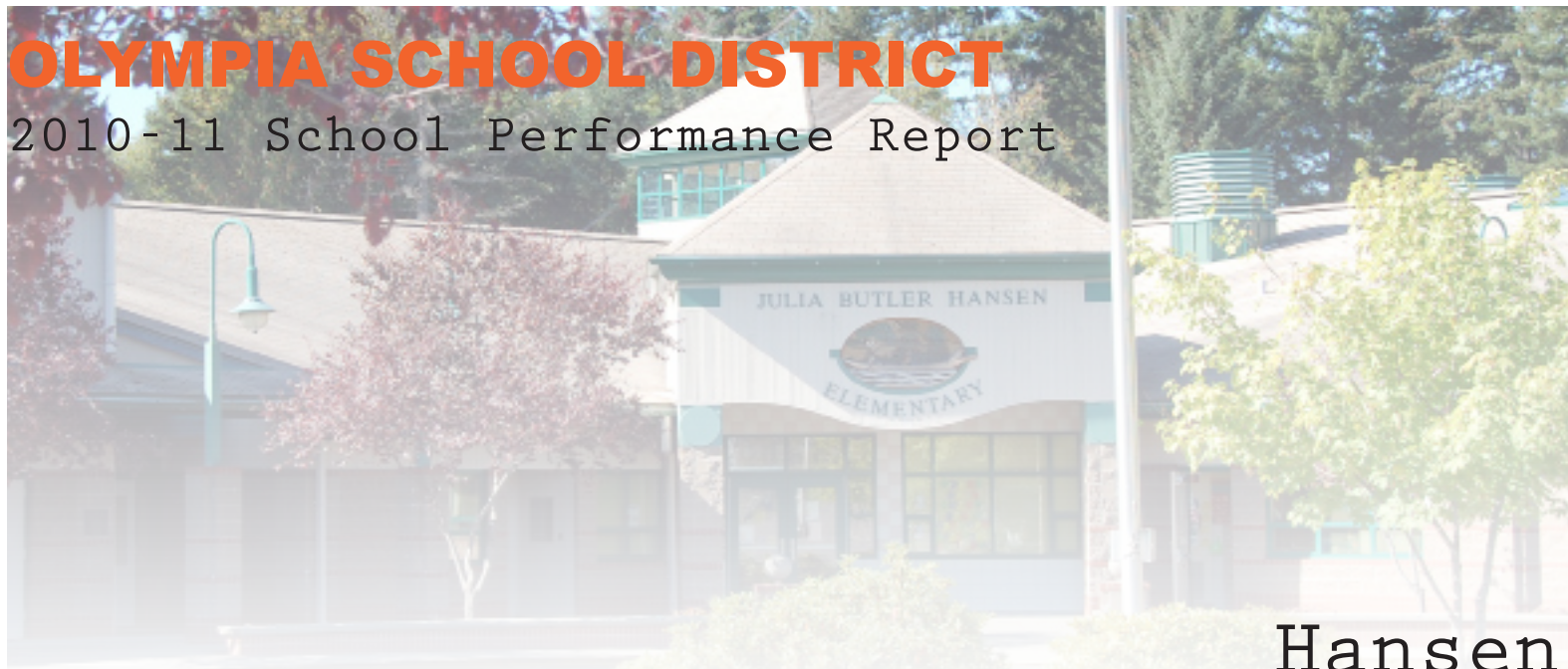

### 2010-11 School Facts

Based on the October 2010 enrollment report, there were 477 students enrolled at Hansen Elementary with an ethnic composition of:

■ African American	5.2%
■ American Indian/ Alaskan Native	1.0%
■ Asian/ Pacific Islander	14.5%
■ Caucasian	59.1%
■ Hispanic	9.2%
■ Two or More Races	10.9%

### Student Demographics:

- 50.7% male students
- 49.3% female students
- The student attendance rate is 94.25%
- Students who qualify for free or reduced-price meals: 37.7%
- Students who qualify for Special Education: 17.7%

### Hansen has a total of 36 classroom teachers

- Average years of teacher experience: 15.8
- Teachers with at least a Master's Degree: 66.7%

### Adequate Yearly Progress

- All of our teachers are highly qualified. Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) is a cornerstone of the federal No Child Left Behind Act and it monitors student achievement from year-to-year. Hansen met 36 out of 37 indicators for AYP, with the exception of Low Income Reading. Hansen is committed to working on all areas of AYP so each child is guaranteed a high-quality education.
- Hansen currently is in School Improvement Step 3. If Hansen meets AYP for the 2011-12 school year, it will remain in School Improvement Step 3. If Hansen does not meet AYP in the 2011-12 school year, it will move to Step 4. Parents and guardians of Hansen students have a Public School Choice (PSC) to transfer their child to an OSD school that is not in School Improvement status. View the OSD overall AYP on page 3.

### About Our School

Julia Butler Hansen Elementary opened in September 1994 and is located on Olympia's west side. Hansen was named for Congresswoman Julia Butler Hansen. The school contains classrooms, which are housed in three pods of four to six classrooms as well as two adjoining classrooms. The physical structure of the facility provides individual classrooms with the flexibility to allow team, multi-age and multi-year teaching situations (i.e. retractable doors between many classrooms). Separate space is also available for classroom activities, English Language Learners support and a student computer lab. The facility includes a Learning Resource Center, Hansen Family Services center as well as a gymnasium, multipurpose room and music room. Hansen houses the Hansen Alternative Program (HAP), a program that emphasizes multi-age classrooms and parent involvement. Another available program for teachers is the National Board Certification, a rigorous training process that focuses on enhancing student learning.

## MEASUREMENTS OF STUDENT PROGRESS

Students in grades 3-5 are required to take an annual state assessment. The scores represent the percent of students meeting the Measurements of Student Progress (MSP) standards.
