About Our School:

Madison Elementary School is an exciting place to learn and grow. Each day over 185 preschool through fifth grade eager and talented students, nearly 30 dedicated staff members and a number of committed volunteers enter Madison ready to have a day filled with learning and friendship.

The school building, which is the pride of the community, opened for the first time in its new location on Legion Way in September 1999, replacing a 44-year-old building on Central Street. The school was designed to fit into the Eastside neighborhood by matching the peaked roofs of the nearby houses and the Spanish-style architecture of the Olympia School District Knox Administration Center on the same campus. It is a beautiful new building both inside and out.

Our programs are designed to give every child the opportunity for success both academically and socially. Our motto is "Succeed with Pride." Notable is our Welcome Room program for students who experience a high rate of mobility. Also notable are the community partnerships we enjoy which strengthen both our school and our community. We are proud of our continued efforts in improving our reading, writing, math, and science WASL scores. Madison Elementary is realizing the dream that all children can succeed.

Our School Improvement Plan:

The **Madison Elementary School** Improvement Plan focuses on the improvement of reading, writing and math skills for all students. Reading instruction is organized around instructional level grouping so that each student learns reading skills at their own instructional level for 90 minutes each day. Writing instruction is 30 minutes each day. Math instruction includes both a problem solving approach as well as computation practice and is 75 minutes each day. A number of supplemental programs round out our students' learning experiences in these core areas. The Plan also includes strategies to help our students be more successful socially. Teacher and staff collaborative time is built into the daily schedule so our professional learning community can thrive.
