McLane Elementary School Mission Statement

McLane Elementary School strives to provide an outstanding learning environment including the quality of its staff, a sense of family, an excellent physical facility and a safe environment which will enable all students to reach their maximum learning potential.

About Our School

McLane School was established in 1883 by pioneer families in the Delphi Valley. Our present school was built in 1987 and is the fourth McLane School building. Our school is comprised of classrooms, special use areas, playshed and three pod areas on the 11.5-acre campus. Adjacent to our campus is a 20-acre wetlands/forest that has become a science, math, writing and art laboratory, as well as the site of our school community service projects.

In addition, there are two preschool classrooms. One group includes children with developmental delays. The other is the ASD program which serves students identified with autism spectrum disorders. The District's Life Skills program for severely impacted students is served at McLane.

McLane also houses the Program for Academically Talented Students (PATS) on the west side of Olympia. Students are bused from their home schools to McLane one day each week.

McLane students may participate in several special programs:

- ▶ GRIN (Global Responsible Individuals Nurturing one another): the GRIN program is a school-wide self-esteem enhancement effort that recognizes the personal uniqueness of our students and reinforces positive social skills.
- ▶ Peer Mediation: Fourth and fifth grade student mediators who have been trained in conflict resolution skills are on duty at each recess to assist their peers in resolving conflicts peacefully and in developing positive problem-solving skills.
- ▶ McLane Forest/Wetlands: McLane students, along with neighbors, community businesses and the Department of Transportation, have reforested over 40 acres of former farmland adjacent to McLane School. In addition, our students, parents, and scouts planted thousands of native shrubs and trees on the Evergreen Parkway overpass near our school. The forest is now used as a living, learning laboratory. The trail has been paved and our students have planted bulbs to enhance the path in the spring.
- ▶ Passport Program: Run completely by our parent volunteers and supported by our PTSO, the Passport Program has helped the entire school learn locations of countries and cities around the world.
- ▶ We have initiated an additional learning opportunity after school for some of our students. With TOGETHER, we are giving students the opportunity to do their homework and participate in a variety of exciting activities.

- ▶ **GOAL 1: READING** – By 2009, 87% of McLane's 4th graders and 87% of 5th graders will meet or exceed the Washington State Reading Standard on the WASL.
- ▶ **GOAL 2: WRITING** – By 2009, 65% of our 4th graders will meet or exceed the Washington State Writing Standard on the WASL.
- ▶ **GOAL 3: MATH** – By 2009, 78% of our 4th graders 78% of 5th graders will meet or exceed the Washington State Standard on the WASL.
- ▶ **GOAL 4: SCIENCE** – By 2009, 55% of the 5th graders will meet or exceed the Washington State standard on the WASL.
