Mission Statement:

We, the Olympia High School Community, are dedicated to personal excellence and responsible citizenship.

About Our School:

Olympia High School is described as one of the oldest public secondary schools in the state. Since its beginning, it has been recognized for quality education-teaching, parent and community support, facilities, and direction.

The first Olympia High School was built in 1906-07, on what is today the Washington State Capitol Campus. In 1918, the building burned down. The second school was built in 1918-1919, located approximately at Capitol Way and 13th Avenue. In 1949, forty acres of the Clover Fields Dairy Farm in Southeast Olympia was purchased by the School District. This is the location of the current Olympia High School. Construction began on the current site in 1958-1961. Olympia High School has undergone a complete renovation, and was rededicated on October 28, 2000.

Based on the October 1, 2005 enrollment report, there are 1,820 students enrolled at Olympia High School with an ethnic composition of:

There are 51.2% male students and 48.8% female students. The student attendance rate is 94.91%.

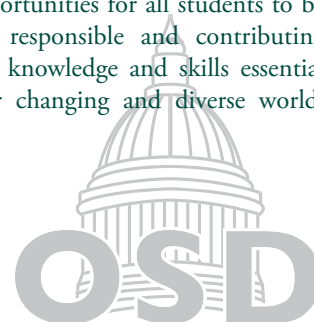

Our School Improvement Plan:

GOAL I and II: Reading and Writing – To hit 98% meeting the Reading and Writing standard and no far misses.

GOAL III : Math –For the Class of 2009, we will break 80% students meeting the WASL Math standard by the end of the year. For the class of 2008, we will achieve 90% meeting the standard by the end of the year. Another goal could include 95% of Geometry students meeting the standard on the first try.

GOAL IV: Science – To achieve a 70% or higher success rate for the Class of 2009 in WASL results. To have less than 3% failure rate in science classes. To achieve a 90% success rate in Biology students passing the WASL
